On March 15th, the Department of Insurance, Securities and Banking put out a bulletin saying that an individual cannot be denied insurance coverage based on gender identity or gender expression. This is the third "state" to do it, after California and Oregon. So basically, private insurance now cannot deny coverage to transgender people. But because gender affirming surgery is considered "cosmetic," that would still not be covered under insurance, even with a diagnoses of Gender Identity Disorder. Additionally, this bulletin is only directed to private health insurance providers in DC and not any public insurance. It's definitely a step in the right direction, but it seems to be a slow one, and one that doesn't include a lot of people and also a lot of different things people might want covered under insurance.
